Letter from Andrew Clifft, Reader in the Benefice of Bures with Assington and Little Cornard



Dear Reader

NATURE WATCH THE SHED DOOR.....

I have discovered that I am not alone in remarking upon the sight of my first swallow every year, and of hearing the cuckoo; this would not be Assington if we didn't have such joys to treasure.



Some people not only take a delight in the first sight and sounds of summer when it lands in Assington, they actually keep a record of it.

Roger and Linda Britcher have kept a written record on their shed door, going back as far as 1994 (for swallows) and 1996 (for cuckoos).

The weather obviously plays an important part in how soon our visitors from Africa arrive, but also we note that fewer swallows in particular head back to

Assington each year. This depletion in numbers may be the result of very poor wet past summers, meaning that no fledglings were raised to carry on the tradition. Then again, the changes in local agriculture, such as spraying, or choice of crops may have an effect on whether our locality can sustain summer visitors to raise a new family here. The new expanse of water locally might well help to attract swallows, which skim across water to catch the bobbing insects.

Looking at the record on the shed door, the earliest hearing of an Assington Cuckoo has been 19th April, - the same date on several occasions, and the latest arrival was 16th May. This year, I understand locals have heard a cuckoo on the 13th May, so again, a "late" year for arrivals.

The earliest swallow to arrive was 20th March in 2004, and although it appears to always be in April (apart from 2004), the latest was 30th April this year (2024)! The dreadful wet and cold spring we have experienced must be a factor here.

Of course, when they do not arrive until later the swallows in particular are less likely to be able to raise as many broods as they tend to do in good years, and so the poor weather impacts on numbers raised, and the number strong enough to make the long flights back and forth annually between their summer breeding grounds and their winter African homes.

Let us hope that the changes in our weather do not deter our swallows and cuckoos from visiting Assington each year, and that numbers build up again to continue to give us pleasure.

BATS ABOUT TREES:

The Water Meadow East of Assington Village

My love for the outdoors developed from a young age, particularly by the enchanting presence of trees that surrounded me as I grew up. As I neared the end of my schooling, my fascination with tree life blossomed into a passion during my work experience with Richard Fordham. Under his guidance, I learnt about the world of tree surgery, where I discovered the remarkable Salix alba.

Blessed with supportive and understanding parents, I embarked on a journey to establish my own tree surgery firm, serving the local villages and surrounding towns earning a reputation for excellence, according to Google! They say patience pays off, and indeed it did when the opportunity arose to claim a meadow in Assington as my own. This open space offered the ideal conditions for cultivating the wonderful Salix alba (Cricket Bat Willow).

The Salix alba, a variety of willow tree grown for its suitability in crafting cricket bats, thrives in the UK climate. Its rapid growth rate not only promises financial rewards but also fills me with immense joy as I witness these trees flourish under my care. The process of nurturing them throughout the year brings a deep sense of fulfilment, combining both business and pleasure.

The young trees planted will mature in 12 – 16 years and during this time the canopy of the trees provides shelter and nesting opportunities for various wildlife species.

And you will likely notice an increase in birds, insects, and other animals as a result of their presence. Upon the felling of any tree, a new young tree will be promptly planted in its place, thus ensuring the perpetual renewal of trees on the land.

A case study carried out by The Environmental Agency and Natural England has shown that Cricket Bat Willow Salix alba significantly reduces the risk of sediment and phosphate affecting the nearby watercourses. Riparian planting along rivers is known to reduce the potential harmful effects from climate change - helping to cool rivers. The trees can also increase water infiltration and reduce nutrient loss. (CSF184 Edition 1 Batting for Nature - A case study on growing willow trees)

Alongside the Cricket Bat Willow *Salix alba* I have also introduced a mixture of native trees, around 200 young trees planted in partnership with the Woodland Trust, a delightful mixture of Oak, Cherry, Hawthorn Hazel and Beech.

These young trees will have a good success rate being from good stock. I have taken great pleasure in planting some Sequoiadendron giganteum, a species well adapted to the UK and helpful in the reverse of their endangered position in the wild in their native California home. The sequoia I have planted at Assington are special to me. I raised these trees from seeds gifted to me from my grandparents, and have delighted in watching them reached their current stage of life, around 3 meters. This is far cry from the potential 50 meters they may reach, but feel they may assist in the reverse of carbon potentially pulling an average of 85 kilograms of carbon out of the atmosphere per year. The Royal Society Open Science and The Royal Botanical Gardens carried out a study into the benefit of growing Sequoias in the UK and conclude they do bring equal importance to the ecological climate in the UK (https://royalsocietypublishing.org/doi/ 10.1098/rsos.230603)

In addition to the planting of trees on this Meadow at Assington, I am introducing flowering bulbs, and seeing the daffodils pop their heads at the beginning of the year I hope brings as much delight to walkers as they do to me.

As with any project, patience is key, and progress may sometimes seem gradual. However, my ultimate vision for the meadow in Assington is to cultivate a magnificent sanctuary—a haven brimming with trees, teeming with nature, and offering serene tranquillity.

THE BREW HOUSE From Angela Bradding

The Brew House runs parallel to The Old Workhouse but is almost hidden behind it from the main road. Like The Old Workhouse it is subject to Grade II Listing.



The Brew House appears significantly older than the workhouse, judging by its timbers and layout, although we have no accurate date yet. You can see the old lathe and plaster between the beams. If funds allow, we would like to date the timbers using the techniques of dendrochronology.

We call this building The Brew House, as archival records attest to it being used to brew small beer for the workhouse residents. We could have named it the Bake or Wash House as there is both physical and written evidence for these functions as well. For example, there is quite a complex inglenook fireplace and chimney structure in a central position, and the cast iron and red brick remains of a bread oven.



The Brew House consists of two floors, although the first floor does not cover the entire footprint of the building. We wonder whether this building started life as a hall house, common in medieval England. These were simple, usually rectangular structures with just a ground floor and an open fire in the middle of the building. The smoke would just rise and go through an opening in the roof. At a later period, a first floor was added if or when money was available. These changes usually necessitated a fireplace and chimney, rather than just a fire. The bricks on The Brew House inglenook chimney look old. For example, they are shallower than say Victorian bricks, another clue to the building's age and relative rarity.







The Brew House is best seen as two sections. It seems that The Dyer's Lane section used to be an independent dwelling and was inhabited until at least 1837 by Elizabeth Simpson. The Overseers refer to this section as "The Old House". We have less clarity about the section of The Brew House at the garden end, although it is clearly contemporaneous with "The Old House". Specifically, we do not know whether this section was lived in before it became known as the bake/brew/wash house of the Overseer's records. There is a slight possibility that it had been the village forge, but we have no clear evidence at present.

The staircase that you can see is in "The Old House" section. We believe that these were built when the mezzanine level was added. You can also see the bare structures of walls and doorways. The floor is laid with red bricks, like The Old Workhouse. We will probably have to raise all the remaining bricks and relay them once the plumbing and groundwork is complete.

It seems that the Brew



House originally had a thatched roof as the Overseer's records include entries for paying for and accepting delivery of thatch to repair The Old House. By the time we bought it, had been reroofed with simple corrugated tin.

I find The Brew House a fascinating building, especially at present whilst it still needs clearing and sorting. It feels like a building stuck in a time warp; it has survived by neglect rather than by proactive preservation. The remains of the bread oven are particularly poignant and reminiscent of a bye gone era. I hope that we can restore it and

once again bake bread in a traditional way. I draw inspiration in this respect from the Miller's Cottage at Pakenham Mill. The oldest sections of the miller's kitchen at Pakenham closely resembles the heart of The Brew House with its working bread oven, washing and brewing coppers. stoves, and chimneys. If you haven't visited Pakenham Mill, I thoroughly recommend it as an informative and enjoyable experience. All in all, The Brew House clearly has a rich and significant history, but it is now in dire need of restoration. We are really looking forward to further research. which should inform our plans to bring this wonderful building back to life.





1974: A GRAND DAY OUTAssington Style

The "Grand" part of this particular event was in order to raise money forwait for it.....


Assington Church Restoration Fund! Today we continue to raise money to create a loo and a small kitchenette in the church, to meet today's requirements for such facilities.


