WELCOME TO MARCH

This year, 1st March is Shrove Tuesday,or, as we like to call it, Pancake Day.

Shrove Tuesday is always exactly 47 days before Easter Sunday, and is the day before Ash Wednesday, which marks the start of Lent.

The word Shrove is derived from the verb Shrive, which means to absolve: ancient christian tradition was to make a point of self-examination, considering what wrongs individuals may need to repent of, and what amendments they could make in order to atone for their sins.

The atonement began on Ash Wednesday, when people in the church would wear sackcloth and their foreheads would be marked with a cross in ash. Rather than fast, during the 40 days of Lent we are nowadays encouraged to "give something up" - such as chocolate, or (in the olden days), smoking; this period of 'fasting' or doing without something which we enjoy is intended to make us feel more righteous, in preparation for the important Christian time of Easter.

Traditionally, therefore, people had to eat up all their 'naughty' foods which they enjoyed, all their foods which contain fat, or rich food on Shrove Tuesday, in readiness for their lenten diet, or 'fast'.



We continue this tradition when we make pancakes, which use fat (lard or oil), flour, eggs, a pinch of salt, and water (or milk). During the cooking of the layer of pancake mixture, we toss it into the air so that it lands once again in the frying pan, but this time upside down, so that both sides are cooked evenly.

Its a simple recipe, which, once mastered without the need for a total redecoration of the kitchen, can be enjoyed with a topping of

fresh lemon juice and a sprinkling of sugar, or, golden syrup, or blueberries and cream.....make it what you will.

I have replied by telephone in the affirmative and politely told him to go ahead.




He seems very nice really and I think he lives somewhere near the pub as I frequently see him sitting outside, although never with a drink.

ROBERT BAMFORD



Robert Bamford was born on 16 June 1883 at **Daws Hall Lamarsh** in Essex. He attended Sherborne School as a day boy from May 1897 to April 1900.

Robert Bamford was a British engineer who, with Lionel Walker Birch Martin founded Bamford & Martin Ltd at 16 Henniker Place in West Kensington on 15 January 1913. Within a year the first car to be named Aston Martin was created by Martin by fitting a four-cylinder Coventry-Simplex engine to the chassis of a 1908 Isotta-Fraschini.

The company's name became Aston Martin in 1914, following one of Lionel Martin's successful runs at the Aston Hill Climb in Buckinghamshire.

They produced their first Aston-Martin car, the *Coal Scuttle*, in March 1915. Robert Bamford was the engineer of the partnership.

But full production could not start because of the outbreak of World War 1. Martin joined the Navy and Bamford the Royal Army Service Corps. All machinery was sold to the Sopwith Aviation Company.

During the First World War Robert served for one year as a private in The London Regiment, 25th (County of London) Cyclist Battalion, and then as a lieutenant with the Army Service Corps (RASC), Mechanical Transport.

After the war, the company relocated to London in 1920 and a new car was designed with the Aston Martin name. That same year Bamford left the company.

In 1924 the company went bankrupt and was refinanced by new owners. The company failed again in 1925 and the factory closed in 1926 with Lionel Martin leaving.


In the mid-1920s the company would undergo many changes of ownership.

It was largely through the ownership of David Brown Ltd. of Huddersfield, who bought Aston-Martin for £20,500 (£820,000 current value) in 1947, that Aston-Martin became the company renowned during the 1950s, and became famous as the James Bond car of choice.

Robert Bamford was inducted into the Automotive Hall of Fame in 2013.

Dear Friends

Just the other day, I went into my garden shed and, mentally, I kicked myself. There on the table was, what looked like, a mouldy lump. I picked it up and found that, in fact, it was a decaying daffodil bulb. I'd forgotten to plant it last October! I'd bought 50. The other 49 have been in the ground for 5 months. Now, their bright green leaves have burst out of the ground. Their yellow, trumpet-shaped flowers are in the garden, glowing like lanterns.

That sorry lump on my table should currently be doing the same, if only I'd planted it!

Enfolding a daffodil bulb in soil produces a wonderful effect. The bulb changes completely. The soil invigorates it. It becomes a totally new creation.

2000 years ago, a man stated that, by being plunged into the right surroundings, we humans can also be totally changed. He wrote, "Anyone who is IN Christ has become a new creation. The old life has gone. The new has begun." Being IN the soil turns an ugly bulb into a beautiful flower. Likewise, with us. Being IN Christ – knowing his forgiveness, being cocooned in his care, filled with his Spirit – will change us completely.

The writer of those words proved to be a living example of that.

OUTSIDE Christ, Saul was a sadistic, murdering ethnic-cleanser.

IN Christ, St Paul (his new name), became a shining light to his generation, and to all future ones as well. It is the season of Lent – a time for reflection.

ASSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Matters of interest discussed at the meeting held in the Village Hall on Monday 31st January 2022

Present: Simon Thorogood (Chair), Andrew Hill (Vice Chair), Councillors Tony Howcroft, Bronwen Stacey, Helen Wallace, Kevin White

In attendance: CCIIr James Finch, DCIIr Lee Parker Christine Hargan (Clerk) and 4 members of the public

Apologies for absence: Cllr lan Jordon

Declarations of Interest and requests for dispensation

Cllr Howcroft made clear that he would not comment on planning item DC/21/06912 given a potential conflict.

Minutes of the previous meeting

The minutes of the meeting held on 29 November 2021, were agreed and thus signed by the Chair.

Public Forum

- *DCIIr Parker advised that the cabinet provisionally agreed a 2% increase council tax, and the rent for council tenants would be increased to £95 a week.
- *Locality budget £500 is still available, Clerk was advised to approach Cllr Parker for details on how to make an effective claim.
- *Members of the public made comments:
- ♦ Care farm Point of note the landlord intends to object to the application on terms on non-compliance. The group have been given notice to vacate site during December 2022.
- Jubilee celebrations, 9 volunteers are ready and willing to organise the event, or assist the Parish Council.;

Dedicate a site for Jubilee Garde;

suggested a plaque, commemorating the oldest and youngest residents on Jubilee day.;

An event/party for children on the playing field;

♦ Speed watch team requested larger community speed watch signs. It was resolved to review following completion of the scheme by highways.

Planning

Members considered the following Planning applications:

❖DC/22/00196 Erection of a two storey front extension; erection of first floor extension over existing bathroom and a cart lodge. Three Ways Barracks Road Assington Suffolk CO10 5LP

It was resolved to support this application

- ❖DC/22/00027 Application for Listed Building Consent -Erection of single storey side/rear Shamrock Farm Marshalls Green Assington Suffolk CO10 5LS It was resolved to support this application
- ❖DC/22/00026 Householder Application Erection of single storey side/rear extension(following demolition of conservatory). Shamrock Farm Marshalls Green Assington Suffolk CO10 5LS

It was resolved to support this application.

♦ DC/21/06912 Change of use from agricultural to use Class F1(a) (Learning and Non-Residential Institutions) and siting of 2no portacabins and 1no storage container. Land At Assington Fruit Farm The Street Assington Suffolk CO10 5LW.

Following extensive discussion, it was resolved to Object to the new planning application given that the new expiry of the permission was not clear, and because operators have received notice from the landlord that they must vacate the site by December. Therefore the PC would support an eight month extension to the existing permission to allow the charity sufficient time to relocate.

- ❖AP/22/00009 Appeal: | Application for Outline Planning Permission (some matters reserved, access to be considered) Town and Country Planning Act 1990. Erection of 2 No one and a half storey dwellings with detached garages and new vehicular access from Barracks Road. The Field House Barracks Road Assington Suffolk CO10 5LP No change to previous comments
- ♦DC/22/00461 Full Planning Application Erection of 1No single storey dwelling, detached garage and new vehicular access. Land At Orchard Road Assington Suffolk As this application was received too late for the publication of the agenda, formal discussion of this was postponed until a further meeting is convened to discuss it.

Status of Planning applications

- ◆DC/21/06155 Re-positioning of Plot 1 dwellinghouse and garage Land North Of Assington Barn, Granted
 ◆DC/21/05464 The Nook 7 Heseltine Close Assington Suffolk CO10 5AL Granted
- ❖Residents in Vicary estate have been offered sections of meadow land behind their properties to purchase and wondered in advance whether the PC would support applications to change of use to garden. Cllr Thorogood to investigate and report back to the next meeting.

■ Update on the Neighbourhood plan

The referendum date is 24th February, and 51% of votes cast will need to be 'yes' for it to become part of planning law. The referendum will be held in the village hall and organised by Babergh. It was resolved to obtain two additional hard copies of the Neighbourhood plan following the election.

Finance

❖Budget for 2022/23

It was resolved to set the budget as per the schedule within the Finance Report (please see the website for details **Precept** for 2022/23

It was resolved to set the Precept at £10,000. The Chair and Clerk signed the form to be returned to Babergh District Council.

Highways Update

The final plans were received following the meeting with CCllr Finch and are entering in consultation until 18th February.. A Quotation for the work is awaited.

- ♦ The Police were concerned about 30 mph restriction extending beyond Rose Green but Suffolk Highways will manage these concerns.
- ♦ The police also raised concern over compliance with the 20mph with no pinch points or physical restrictors, and as a result, gateways entering and exiting the village were recommended.
- ♦ Clearer signage would be provided on Barracks Road. The council was reminded that road safety was the most prominent concern to come out of the neighbourhood plan consultations, and that the proposals were broadly in line with Community Actions CA3 and CA4. A proposal to accept the design was heard from Cllr Hill and seconded by Cllr Wallace.

A proposal to delegate authority to Cllr Hill and Cllr Thorogood to approve costs of up to £22,000 for the works was heard from Cllr White and seconded by Cllr Stacey. Both proposals were accepted unanimously.

Quiet Lanes, Suffolk

Progressing but awaiting signs from Suffolk Highways.

■ Queen's Platinum Jubilee **Village Celebrations**

Fantastic support from the village. Cllr Stacey has booked the village hall all day on Friday 3rd June.

Various ideas were discussed and a working party would be formed with community volunteers. Cllr Stacey agreed to be

the Parish Council representative. It was resolved to provisionally budget a contribution of £500 and additional help with licences if required, The focus of the budget is for entertainment rather than gifts.

❖Jubilee Green − Cllr Hill produced a plan for proposed work and will apply for a licence from BDC, Clerk to draft response to DCllr Parker, asking for contribution toward the work and it was resolved that a spend £6-7,000 would be made from ClL funds. Cllr Hill was thanked for all of his work on the project.

Bramford to Twinstead Tee

DCllr Parker disappointed that National Grid will not progress with face to face meetings, and would escalate. Consultation documents had arrived. Nothing had changed for Assington. CCllr Finch assured the community that the

third line toward Norwich would avoid the village. It was noted that National Grid have been invisible throughout the entire process.

Meeting via zoom on 7 February with Little Cornard PC: Cllr Stacey would take questions to the meeting as emailed by Cllr Howcroft

Questions to the Chair

❖Possible purchase of land to retain meadowland in the village to the rear of Warner Close.

Should the land be marketed in the future it could be considered as a purchase from available Grants and CIL funding

Assington Autos, while noting that conditions on existing planning consent may potentially be flouted, supporting documentary evidence was difficult to obtain,

NATIONAL GRID CONSULTATION ON THE BRAMFORD TO TWINSTEAD REINFORCEMENT PROGRAMME

We are currently in a brief period of public consultation on this important and emotive subject,

which ends on 21 March 2022.

The proposal (in brief) is to remove the existing smaller set of pylons carrying 132kV cables, and to replace these through the parish of Assington with larger pylons carrying a 400kV line. This means that there will be two lines of large pylons along the stretch of the Parish.

There will be two Cable Sealing End compounds in our area: one in Leavenheath to the immediate West of Boxford Fruit Farm.

the second to the South of Workhouse Green.

In the areas of AONB and the Stour Valley, to the East and West of Assington respectively, the new cables will be undergrounded. The two Cable Sealing End compounds

mentioned above are the sites where the cable changes from underground to overground.

Inevitably, for all concerned where the reinforcement work takes place, there will be disruption for local residents during the time the project is undertaken.

Until very recently, National Grid were proposing to undertake all consultations via methods other than via face to face meetings; this approach has now been modified, and therefore the Parish Council has very recently been involved in a flurry of activity and last-minute meetings of various kinds. We continue to meet with other local and affected Parish Councils in order to formulate and agree a united combined response to NG.

In addition, there are plans for a Public Meeting in the Village Hall. Details on this will be announced shortly. This meeting may be useful to ensure that there is a coordinated line of response from residents.

Although the Parish Council will respond to National Grid in line with our corporate views it is also extremely important that all individuals respond to National Grid with their views on the proposals; as this is, in effect, a large Planning matter, in the same way, the more responses NG receive, the more it 'counts'. If they only receive one corporate response from APC on behalf of residents, it only counts as one response; if everyone in Assington responds in the consultation, it will count for a lot more!

Of course, we are absolutely delighted that we have such wonderful and (comparatively) rare plants growing in our midst, and we should be extremely sad if anything should happen to them.

The bee orchid, is sadly in decline - it takes between 5 - 8 years to grow and once picked, that's it. It's seeds never get a chance to germinate, and it's gone forever. Also, of course, they do not grow again if they have been uprooted and transplanted, as the conditions will not be the same as their original location, and they do not like being disturbed.



We must be careful to both enjoy them and protect them where they choose to grow; look out for their flowers in June. Please take a photograph of them if you can, and send it in to the Assington News, for publication.

THE HEALTH COLUMN

The Benefits of playing Table Tennis...

I have read that in 1901 two rival organisations were set up. The Table Tennis Association was first, and this was closely followed by the Ping Pong Association four days later.

It seems those associations have long disappeared but, while the two terms are interchangeable, the International Table Tennis Federation still prefers people to use the term 'table tennis' rather than 'Ping pong' when talking about the rules of the sport!

It is a sport that welcomes everyone, and Table Tennis England highlights 10 benefits of playing the game:

- Good for your health
- Easy on the body/joints
- > There are no age barriers
- > Everyone can play
- You can play anywhere
- > You can play anytime (summer/winter/indoors/outdoors)
- > It's affordable
- > It's good for the brain
- > It's sociable
- It's fun

It's a social activity and it brings out the competitive streak in many, there are also significant health benefits that don't require you to break into a sweat to achieve improvements...

- Enhanced motor functions. Not so much related to cars, but nerve and brain links that enable us to become coordinated, learn patterns of movement and memory of hand/
 - eve coordination skills.
- Improved reflexes Gross and fine muscle reflexes are challenged and improved over time with fast-paced movements over a relatively short distance.
- Hand eye coordination improves through a combination of mental alertness, concentration and some tactical strategy, the latter mostly where you are intending to hit the ball so that your opponent can't return it!
- Joint care. There is some movement involved side to side around the end of the table, but it doesn't typically require too much extreme movement or load through our joints (unless you have to bend to pick the ball up off the floor as often as I do?

- Calorie burner yes you read that right, as it is thought a 68kg person can burn 272 calories by playing table tennis for an hour. Never bad for stealthy weight management.
- Brain training. Increased motor skills as mentioned as well as cognitive awareness improve brain health. By anticipating an opponent's shot, a player uses the prefrontal cortex for strategic planning. The aerobic exercise from the physical activity of the game stimulates the hippocampus, the part of the brain that is responsible for allowing us to form and retain long-term facts and events. Some preliminary studies suggest it may help prevent dementia.
- Improved Balance movement at different speeds and directions depending on the shots you are trying to hit or defend challenge foot and ankle muscles in addition to the lower leg nerves and muscles to help maintain or improve general balance.

It can be a marvel to watch the skill of a rally between two people standing at least 5 feet away from the table and hitting the ball to the very edge with seemingly minimal effort. Equally it can be quite surprising when a shot with such top spin bounces in completely the opposite direction to what you expected when on the receiving end. It can be easy to forget that some people have been playing for years and their coordination, reaction times and fine movement is well honed, but those new to table tennis must start somewhere and for most of us relative newbies, hitting the ball more than once is an achievement, if not with some incredibly comical and beginners luck fluke shots to add to the mix!

Table tennis caters for all ages and abilities and Assington has its own table tennis session, in the Village Hall every Sunday night 6.00pm-9.00pm (£3 per person) where you can play on one of the 3 brand new tables, and everyone mixes up to play different games.




