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HARVEST IN ASSINGTON, AND OUR FOODBANK COLLECTION



Our Harvest Service will take place in St Edmund's Church at 10.30am on Sunday, 15th October. As

always, the church is beautifully decorated with the fruits of harvest, seasonal flowers and foliage. Please do join us for this annual celebration; contributions from children (and adults too!) are accepted at the front of the church at an appointed stage in the Service

Assington's harvest was traditionally linked particularly to the apple harvest, reflecting the large apple orchards which stretched across much of the centre of the village until fairly recently. Sadly, we now have difficulty in obtaining free apples to decorate the church as in the past.

That's not to say that we don't have a number of local farms which focus predominantly on cereal and vegetable crops: we do! See the photos above and below.



Farmers work very hard throughout the year, battling the many foibles of the weather and everything else life throws at them; we are fortunate to still live in an area where we are able to see man and woman at work with nature on our

However, some people living comparatively close to us, in and around Sudbury, are not so fortunate.

Over the last couple of years the demand for food from families struggling to make ends meet has increased greatly.

The Vineyard Church runs the Storehouse Foodbank in Sudbury.

The Storehouse Foodbank benefits from working closely with a number of local supermarkets, to collect food donations from members of the public, and also from the supermarkets themselves. I feel sure that many of us regularly make donations when we are doing our food shopping.

In addition, here in Assington we collect food donations at the Harvest celebration, and also in the village Farm Shop; we deliver them up to the Foodbank. Currently the list of items which they need are as follows:

If you are able to donate such items, we should be most grateful if you would bring them along to the Harvest Service in Church. We very much hope and look forward to seeing you then.

Not only do the donations make a lovely 'modern day" equivalent to the more traditional fruit and veg box of our childhood, but they also demonstrate our celebration and giving thanks for the harvest which gives us our supply of food throughout the year; they also make such a difference to the lives of others, which of course is the true spirit of the reason we do this.

If you are not able to join us at the church service, but wish to donate items to our Assington Collection for the foodbank,

there will also be a collection box in the Farm Shop at The Barns, until Saturday, 14th October,

and a collection table at the back of the hall at the Harvest Supper.Talking of which:

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
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ROGER KEMP

Hello All, Without doubt CPR and Defibrillator training could save someone's life in the event of a cardiac arrest, be it a member of your family, a friend or a member of the public and it can strike at any time, sometimes without warning. It is fact that if you act quickly and follow process the chances of survival greatly increases to around 70%, if you do nothing survival rate is around 20%.

We will shortly have 3 defibrillators located in the village, at The Village Hall, The Shoulder of Mutton, and at The Foxes Den

I have been in contact with the Nayland First Responder Team who are qualified to give this training to anyone who would like to attend at The Village Hall on the following dates. Availability is limited to 12 candidates per session.

Wednesday 18th October at 7pm Friday 27th October at 7pm Saturday 28th October 10am Sunday 29th October 10am

This vital training is open to all ages, the training is free of charge however the team are a charity and do have to replace and update equipment so could I ask for a small donation for their outstanding work for communities within 5 miles of Nayland.

Everything else in the garden is groing well into the autumn and we are living almost completely off the land with late crops of spinach, chard and fennal, lanced with heaps of chillie peppers, phew, sometimes I feel as if I am breathing fire and full of energy, although the terrible flatulence can be a problem, almost an orchestra sometimes but healthy tunes I guess.

Still looking for a job as the money is tight right now with winter approaching and more time on my hands maybe, surely someone can use my many skills, decorating, gardening, light building work and even housework are within my remit, cant drive but can still walk 5 miles easy for the right job. Have given up on the bus as still cant figure out how to get home from anywhere even if it comes to pick me up, which in itself seems to be erratic. Waited in shelter for three hours yesterday with no luck and when I got to Colchester the week before, I was stranded in a place called Stoke and had to walk home through woods and fields, which was blissfull with all the birds and animals around and above me, made me realise how lucky I am to spend my twilight years in such a beautiful place, and reminded me off my childhood on the farm

Got a terrible blasting when I arrived home in the dark, Bobbie was furious that I had not turned the oven on to cook the prepared evening meal at the end of her long working day, along with all the other tasks and listed jobs that I had not carried out. We had a furious row which ended with her in terrible tears saying how worried she had been to get home and find me missing. I think that young people do not always have the patience of us older folk.

However after eating beans on some toast with yet more hot chillies, she apologised through floods of tears for her bad language and we made up and had a lovely evening and best night ever. I have since done most of the tasks and jobs asked and we have agreed to spend a couple of nights away at some herbal establishment in a place called Heath Farm, near the coast.

I will enjoy that, I hope they have lots of animals and gardens.

I have finished the front drive in the evenings, when it has been cooler and darker, so that we can get both halves of her new hybred car in and made up a lead for it, as one half of the car has to be plugged in for that half of the engine to run. I promptly cut it in half with the mower but have taped it up and hid that piece of the lead in the rodendrum bush on the corner of the house, herself has said that we need a roof panel to make our own power now and as we are now getting on so well I have agreed to that. She says that it is free and we will even be paid a little to have it done, so cant be a bad thing.

Will have to go now as someone is hammering on the door with a ladder, will try to write more musings from my life around the bend next month when I get back from our trip to the farm.

Letter from the Rev Daniel Whiffin, Vicar of Bures with Assington and Little Cornard

Dear friends

Have you ever wondered at the purpose of harvest festivals? I suppose, at least here in rural Suffolk we see the harvest happening around us, even if many of us are not directly involved. In my previous parish, in Bromley, which is in the suburban sprawl of Greater London, attendees of the church harvest festival could well have avoided seeing a tractor all year! Yet it was-



perhaps even more—important for us to mark the festival.

God gives the history of the people of Israel in the Old Testament as a model for all of us, teaching us about our relationship with him. The Israelites were warned, in Deuteronomy chapters six and eight, of a great danger. Moses cautions, 'when you have eaten and are satisfied, praise the Lord your God for the good land he has given you. Be careful that you do not forget the Lord your God.' It is so easy to slip into living as though all the good we enjoy we earned for ourselves. I'm sure you have worked hard for what you enjoy. Even so, it is God 'who gives us the ability to produce wealth.' Again and again, through their history, God's people forgot God and what he had given them.

The greatest gift God has given us is Jesus. Through his selfsacrifice, he provides forgiveness for when we have failed to give our generous God his due in our lives. We're also told that, through faith in Jesus, we're given new hearts-no longer prone to forget the Lord our God.



WOW.....the Fete.....many thanks.


We did well both in terms of getting The TOWER PROJECT off the ground, and, hopefully., in giving everyone a fun afternoon.

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



Matters of Interest discussed during a meeting held at Assington Village Hall on Monday 31st July 2023

Present: Councillors Simon Thorogood, Andrew Hill, Tony Howcroft, David Wiles, Helen Wallace & Ian Jordan In attendance: CCIIr James Finch, DCIIr Lee Parker, Christine Hargan (Clerk) and one member of the public.

Apologies for absence: Cllr Bronwen Stacey

■ County and District Councillor reports and public forum:

Suffolk County Council report

- *CCIIr Finch highlighted the Sudbury-based charity Success After Stroke charity, which provides care, help and therapy to stroke survivors
- *Ukrainian refugees: SCC is working with housing providers to assist families in finding rented accommodation, and providing a £2,000 support grant to assist them
- *Libraries: the current contract for provision of library services is ending soon and a new contract is being sought. The mobile library service forms part of this, and it is important that those who value it also make use of it
- •Fire Service: for the past five years Suffolk has shared a control room with Cambridgeshire Fire Service, which is replacing its system. The contractor has not delivered on the contract so Suffolk is now operating solo
- *SCC is digitising its records. Ancestry.com is assisting by providing the software
- Items in blue (recycling) bins must not be bagged as they will not be recycled
- •Fostering: 960 children in Suffolk are in care, including some refugees. Work continues to recruit additional foster carers
 •CCIIr Finch has met with the Project Director of National Grid at Langham and advised that some undergrounding is proposed outside of AONB in Great Horkesley. He will be cooperating with the District Council as it responds to National

Babergh District Council Report

DCIIr Parker reported

- •The cabinet's main points of focus are climate change and collaboration on communities, as many Neighbourhood Plans have been implemented
- Pressure is being maintained on National Grid to consider all options for the new infrastructure between Norwich and Tilbury
- •The mandatory annual re-registration of voters is in progress •Initiative to make homes more energy-efficient: grants are available of up to £18,000 per household, open to homeowners and landlords where household income is less than £31,000, among other eligibility criteria
- •Failings in BDC Election processes: an action plan is in place to ensure problems do not reoccur, and will be brought before the Audit Commission this year
- •The option is available to attend Housing Committee meetings online, should attendance be necessary
- •Appeal no AP/22/00009 re development of 2 houses in Barracks Road Assington was dismissed and the Neighbourhood Plan was upheld by the planning inspector.
 •DCllr Parker reported that consistency in supporting Neighbourhood Plans is now being seen.

 Climate change: the District Council is already committed to reaching net zero by 2030

Public forum

• A member of the public reported that the solar industry is unregulated, and was concerned to ensure that any investment is sound. Solar inverters function only if there is an

electrical supply, so they do not work during power cuts. The scheme must be registered with MCMS in order to sell the electricity generated.

- Consider any planning application received since the agenda was posted There were none

Finance

- From the RFO, review Reconciliation of Accounts against Bank Statements and the Statement of Accounts vs Budget Report authorise payments made/to be made and note income received since the last meeting Accepted
- Open additional bank accounts with Unity Trust Bank. Documents were signed.

Review any issues raised for the Licensed Path, Footpaths and APC's Assets

- Resolved to engage Bryn Hurren to supply and fit two noticeboards and associated legs as per the quotation provided to Cllr Hill. A budget of £1200 was agreed
- Cllr Thorogood reported concern regarding a length of hedge on the roadside by Assington Garage and it was resolved to engage a local contractor to trim
- Councillors agreed a response to Suffolk County Council regarding bus stop, sharing deep concern in the village from users of the bus service pending further discussion.

Projects to consider for **CIL** expenditure

- Village hall projects: the project to install solar panels will cost approx £24,000. Decision on co-funding with the Village Hall charity to be made, subject to business plan offering benefit to the village, once any grant funding is confirmed. Potential cost of £13,000 for the installation of EV charging equipment – funding to be discussed once any grant is confirmed
- Agreed scope of footpath accessibility works for feasibility study, focusing on the area from the entrance to the Thicks to the Village Hall. Cllr Howcroft to contact landowner of Sheepwalk Barn to discuss potential improvements to stiles

Questions to the Chair

- Photinia hedge: retrospective planning application has been refused.
- Councillors considered a proactive offer to the landowner to create a public space on the meadow adjacent to the fishing lakes. Cost could be prohibitive.
- Next scheduled meeting will be held on Monday 25th September 2023 at 7.30pm.
- The meeting was closed at 9.20pm

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THE DRIVE, RIDE AND STRIDE EVENT ON THE **HOTTEST DAY OF THE YEAR Jeff Stacey**

I took part in the 50th running of the Suffolk Historic Churches Ride and Stride event. This year I chose to start in Hartest. In planning my route I noticed there were many hamlets called something Green and decided to make visiting them the theme for the day. I naturally included Assington Green, which I explored after my first few visits to Somerton, Hawkedon and

> Stansfield Churches.

It is only a few houses tucked away on a back road and includes the pretty thatched cottage pictured.

Denham St Mary's church is a small chapel associated with Denham Hall. You enter via a side extension to have your breath taken away by the magnificent tomb of Suzan and Edward Lewkenor. They died in 1605, with Edward dving the day after his wife. They are depicted with their surviving two sons and six daughters.

After All Saints Church Wickhambrook, I cycled up through

Victorian sensibilities and was renamed.

I was searching for Denham Church when I spotted an old

> Other visitors to Denham Church were a family in an immaculate TVR Chimera. They treated us to an impromptu performance on the church organ, accompanied by very accomplished soprano singing.

My next stop was Hargrave Church, chosen as this is dedicated to St Edmund.

It is hidden away up a long track which was fine to cycle, but not deemed suitable to risk the undersides of the classic cars. The TVR was parked at the bottom of the track and the family had walked up to the church. I

encouraged another musical performance, but the organ was a small harmonium type, reliant on energetic pumping of foot pedals to provide air

pressure to the pipes. A short tune was possible, but the work out required for

anything longer was too much on a hot day.

I cycled next to All Saints Chevington. This is situated on the edge of the Ickworth House estate. The musical theme was continued, but only in the carved pew ends that showed different musicians. The picture shows a character playing two woodwind instruments.

My return to Hartest was via St Petronilla, Whepstead. I was intrigued by the unfamiliar name and now know

> she was an early Christian martyr from Roman times. She was killed for refusing to marry and lose her virginity. As I was cycling on the hottest day of the year I took a few short cuts and reduced my route to 36 miles. Even so, I was most appreciative of the air conditioning in the car on the drive back to Assinaton.

Thank you to all my sponsors for your support, it is most appreciated. As always the money raised will be split equally between Assington Church and the Suffolk Historic Churches Trust. The money for the Trust goes into a grants chest which enables them to help churches in their moments of need.

On my way to Assington Green I visited Somerton Church, planning my route to go down the steep hill, past the very well kept alms houses to go to Hawkedon.

Hawkedon Church is set in splendid isolation on a green. It had the first of many decorated pew ends which seemed to be a feature of the churches in this part of Suffolk. The one pictured had three faces.

possibly representing the trinity, which makes it more surprising that it had escaped the literal defacing by supporters of Oliver Cromwell that was evident in this and other churches I visited.

> After Stansfield my next church was Denston. This retained its old pews with carved ends, this time with an animal theme. The pair of rabbits pictured were here. but many of the creatures were less

> > easy to identify and

fantastical in nature.

Also pictured is the tomb of Lord and Lady Denston, from Denston Hall. It is very unusual in depicting them in their shrouds, rather than the usual finery we are used to seeing.

"Volunteers are matched with a family, then visit or call them once a week to provide vital emotional support and practical help. It's very satisfying to see families get the help they need when they need it most and seeing them blossom and grow in confidence is so rewarding."
